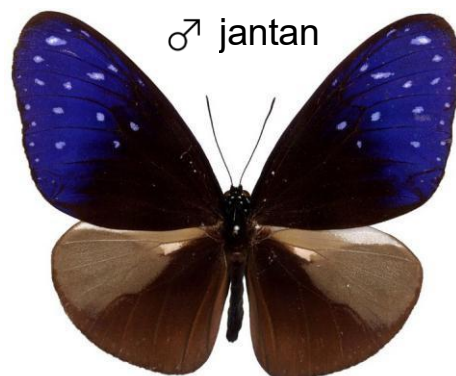
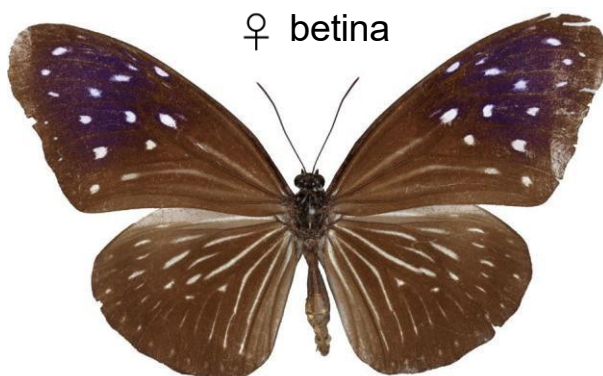
Poisonous Butterflies

Introduction

There are several butterflies species known to be poisonous. The toxins derived from the chemical compounds present in the host plants as it was consumed during their larval stage and are subsequently stored in the adult butterflies. Although it is harmless towards humans upon contact, these chemical compounds caused the butterflies inedible to the natural predators, such as birds. In Lambir Hills National Park, over 20 species of poisonous butterflies have been documented (Itioka *et al.*, 2009). This booklet presents 23 species (in 3 families) of poisonous butterflies and 5 species of non-poisonous mimicking butterflies (in 3 families), as recorded by Itioka *et al.* (2009). All collected specimens deposited in the Insectarium of the Forest Department Sarawak.

Terdapat beberapa spesies kupu-kupu yang dikenali pasti beracun. Toksin tersebut berasal daripada bahan kimia yang terkandung dalam tumbuhan yang dimakan semasa di peringkat larva, dan terus disimpan dalam tubuh sehingga kupu-kupu menjadi dewasa. Walaupun tidak berbahaya kepada manusia apabila disentuh, bahan kimia tersebut menyebabkan kupu-kupu tidak dapat dimakan oleh pemangsa semula jadi seperti burung. Di Taman Negara Bukit Lambir, lebih 20 spesies kupu-kupu beracun telah direkodkan (Itioka et al., 2009). Buku ini memperkenalkan 23 spesies (daripada 3 famili) kupu-kupu beracun dan 5 spesies (daripada 3 famili) kupu-kupu tidak beracun yang menyerupai, seperti yang dicatatkan oleh Itioka et al. (2009). Koleksi spesimen tersebut telah disimpan di Insektarium Jabatan Hutan Sarawak.
